## Breast feeding the hungry baby

#### FOR BREAST-FEEDING MUMS

No one gets it right the first time, no matter how many books you read or videos you watch. It's important to stay hydrated, rested and relaxed for milk to generate. If milk doesn't flow, complementing with bottle feed is normal. Here are some things that'll help make it easier and less messy

□ NURSING BRA / TOPS (4-5)
 These are real convenient.

 □ NURSING PADS (2 BOXES)
 They soak up excess milk when the baby doesn't need them. Remember when the baby feeds on one side, milk will flow from both so nursing tops and pads help prevent a huge mess!

 □ BREASTPUMPS

If you have a sleepy baby, chances are the milk will build up, causing pressure and pain for mummy. Pumps help relief the pressure and prevent mastitis 🕾

□ HANKERCHIEFS (10-20)

Keep these under baby's chin while feeding and burping. Remember, babies throwing up milk is completely normal and typically means they're full

## Bottle feeding the hungry baby

### FOR BOTTLE-FEEDING MUMS

Not breastfeeding doesn't make you a bad mother so don't let anyone guilt-trip you into thinking so. Lots of us were bottle fed and we grew up healthy and strong and smart too ©

☐ MILK POWDER (1 TIN)

Ask your hospital what brand they're using and its best to use the same to reduce chances of stomach upset for lil baby'o

☐ MILK BOTTLES (3-6)

☐ HOT WATER FLASK

@ 4am when you or your spouse need to wake up and make milk, these flasks certainly beat waiting forever for water to boil

☐ HANKERCHIEFS (10-20)

Keep these under baby's chin while feeding and burping. Remember, babies throwing up milk is completely normal and typically means they're full

□ BOTTLE BRUSHES

☐ STERILISER

for the bottles and pacifier

## **OPTIONAL**

□ BOTTLE RACKS

Really useful for drying bottles though

□ NURSING PADS (1 BOX)

Trust me, you'll be needing some

□ BREASTPUMPS

You won't need to invest in expensive ones but having one does help relief built up pressure that could turn into mastitis

## Caring for baby's health

#### ☐ THERMOMETER

You'll be using this for years, so go for a good one so it's more accurate. Forehead scan thermometers are useful for babies

#### □ BUCKET & SOFT TOWEL

In case of high fever, useful for sponging

## ☐ MOSQUITO GUARDS

If you stay in an area that's prone to mosquitos or would like to bring your baby to the park for a walk, this would be useful. Note: some kids might be allergic to the venom and develop blisters from the bites

## □ CREAMS FOR INSECT BITES

## ☐ CREAMS FOR MILK RASH

If you find tiny red spots on your baby's cheeks, it could be milk rash.

## **OPTIONAL**

#### ☐ HUMIDIFIER

If your baby is sleeping in an airconditioned room, this keeps the air moist

## □ AIR PURIFIER

So useful especially during haze or if you have furry friends at home

## Around the house

#### □ DAY BED

A smaller bed is useful so the baby can spend some time outside in the hall or somewhere near you while you watch Netflix or cook up a meal

## Bathing your baby

#### □ BATH TUB

It'd be good to check if your hospital will be handing this out as a gift

#### □ BABY SHAMPOO

There are many brands available in the market, designed to be mild on baby's scalp and eyes

## □ BABY BODYWASH

## ☐ SMALL CONTAINER

These are useful to scoop up water when you're washing the baby's hair

## ☐ BATH TOWELS (2-3)

## □ TALCUM POWER

Your baby won't be needing it until a few months later when he/she begin gaining motor skills

## Day out with baby

#### **□** BABY CARRIER

Babies typically gain neck control around 4 to 5 months so if you're getting a baby carrier, be sure to find one suitable for new born. A carrier frees your hands and makes it easier to walk through crowded places

#### □ BABY STROLLER

There are so many choices; some offer a bigger storage space, some offer accessories for newborn and toddler seats, some open and close with one click.

#### □ BABY BAG

These can get heavy easily so while sling bags look good, backpacks offer a more ergonomic structure for the parent's back. Also consider the compartments available to segregate milk, water bottles, diapers, tissues, toys, clothes etc

## Other bigger decisions
